1 MR. LEIMBACH: We'll call the meeting  
 2 to order. And do you want to take roll  
 3 call?  
 4 MR. JAMISON: We don't ever take roll  
 5 call.  
 6 MR. LEIMBACH: You know who's here. I  
 7 have to write down who is here.  
 8 MR. JAMISON: I've already written down  
 9 who's here.  
 10 MR. LEIMBACH: Okay. Good.  
 11 MR. JAMISON: I already put that down.  
 12 MR. LEIMBACH: The next thing would be  
 13 approve of the agenda.  
 14 MR. JAMISON: Yeah, we need to --  
 15 somebody needs to move to approve the  
 16 agenda.  
 17 MR. LEIMBACH: Did everybody get the  
 18 amendment to the agenda, thing about  
 19 putting --  
 20 MR. COOPER: Yes. I move that we  
 21 approve the agenda.  
 22 MR. MILEY: Okay. I second it.  
 23 MR. LEIMBACH: All in favor say "aye."  
 24 (All respond "aye.")  
 25 MR. LEIMBACH: It's unanimous. The

1 next thing then --  
 2 MR. COOPER: Can I go? I would like  
 3 to move that we reinstate Dallas Marshall  
 4 onto the Soil and Water Conservation Board.  
 5 MR. JAMISON: We need to stay with the  
 6 agenda.  
 7 MR. LEIMBACH: No, that is -- we  
 8 changed the agenda to --  
 9 MR. JAMISON: I didn't get that. I put  
 10 the agenda on the web page and if you don't  
 11 send me the changes in time, I can't change  
 12 it. So I --  
 13 MR. LEIMBACH: Steve changed it; he  
 14 sent it to you, didn't he?  
 15 MR. JAMISON: I haven't seen it.  
 16 MR. TULLER: I have been tied up in  
 17 meetings all day today; I haven't even  
 18 looked at my computer. Did it come today?  
 19 MR. LEIMBACH: No. You sent -- I sent  
 20 it to you and you sent it back to me.  
 21 MR. COOPER: It was last week.  
 22 MR. LEIMBACH: Last week. It was last  
 23 week.  
 24 MR. COOPER: Or earlier this week.  
 25 I got it.

1 MR. MILEY: I got it.  
 2 MR. JAMISON: And the next thing on the  
 3 agenda is to approve the minutes for the  
 4 last month. That's on --  
 5 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, okay. The agenda  
 6 didn't get modified.  
 7 MR. JAMISON: This is your agenda.  
 8 MR. LEIMBACH: I know, but we changed  
 9 it and he sent out to message you. You  
 10 didn't get his email?  
 11 MR. JAMISON: No.  
 12 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, okay. We can  
 13 quickly do the -- we need to -- everybody  
 14 read the minutes, got a copy of them.  
 15 MR. COOPER: Yes.  
 16 MR. LEIMBACH: There is an error.  
 17 MR. COOPER: Yes.  
 18 MR. LEIMBACH: We've got -- Joe Dugger  
 19 is not on the checkbook. It's Robert  
 20 Roddenberry. You've got to fix that.  
 21 MR. JAMISON: I'm not understanding  
 22 half of --  
 23 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, it says in the  
 24 minutes --  
 25 MR. JAMISON: Listen, I'm not

1 understanding you talking with your mask.  
 2 MR. LEIMBACH: Okay. You've got Joe  
 3 Dugger's name in there; it's supposed to be  
 4 Robert Roddenberry.  
 5 MR. JAMISON: Whose?  
 6 MR. LEIMBACH: On the checkbook, to  
 7 change the checkbook.  
 8 MR. JAMISON: Yeah, we have to go to  
 9 the bank.  
 10 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah, but mit's not Joe  
 11 Dugger; it's Robert Roddenberry. You've got  
 12 the wrong name in there.  
 13 MR. JAMISON: In the minutes you're  
 14 talking about?  
 15 MR. LEIMBACH: Yes.  
 16 MR. JAMISON: Okay.  
 17 MR. LEIMBACH: Did anybody else have  
 18 anything on the minutes?  
 19 MR. COOPER: That's the only thing  
 20 that I saw. I move that we accept the  
 21 minutes.  
 22 MR. MILEY: I second it.  
 23 MR. LEIMBACH: All those in favor say  
 24 "aye."  
 25 (All respond "aye.")

1 have the power to accept appointments and we  
 2 appointed you, we appointed you. It's not  
 3 the same as getting elected. That's a whole  
 4 different thing.  
 5 MR. MARSHALL: I understand.  
 6 MR. LEIMBACH: So all we have to do is  
 7 put it in the minutes, vote that you're  
 8 appointed.  
 9 MR. MARSHALL: And I am to, see, he's  
 10 not officially a member yet.  
 11 MR. LEIMBACH: He was appointed by  
 12 one --  
 13 MR. JAMISON: There's three of us here,  
 14 that is quorum.  
 15 MR. MARSHALL: You are not officially a  
 16 member of this body until you've taken the  
 17 sworn office and --  
 18 MR. LEIMBACH: Okay. Let's back off of  
 19 that. I talked to the -- the problem is  
 20 we're a county organization, a state  
 21 organization and a federal organization, so  
 22 we've got too many different rules. But  
 23 appointments for vacancies until elections  
 24 are different than getting elected. Once  
 25 again --

1 MR. COOPER: What is next?  
 2 MR. JAMISON: You've got to slow down.  
 3 MR. LEIMBACH: Well --  
 4 MR. COOPER: She's taking the minutes.  
 5 She's taking the minutes, this court  
 6 reporter. I'm sorry. I didn't tell you.  
 7 For tonight's meeting, she's going to take  
 8 detailed minutes and send them back to you.  
 9 MR. LEIMBACH: Then you can fix them.  
 10 MR. COOPER: You don't have to take  
 11 any more notes today. She will give you an  
 12 official transcript.  
 13 MR. LEIMBACH: It will all be typed in  
 14 English.  
 15 MR. JAMISON: Okay.  
 16 MR. LEIMBACH: The next thing on the  
 17 agenda officially -- well, as chairman, I  
 18 want to request that we adjust the agenda to  
 19 do one thing first.  
 20 MR. COOPER: Yes.  
 21 MR. LEIMBACH: We need to get Dallas  
 22 back on board, and that is by appointment.  
 23 MR. JAMISON: Actually --  
 24 MR. LEIMBACH: As chairman -- I was  
 25 acting chairman, but now I'm chairman. I

1 MR. MARSHALL: I understand that. But  
 2 in both cases before you can vote, you have  
 3 to take an oath of office, in both cases,  
 4 elected or appointed.  
 5 MR. LEIMBACH: That's not what it says  
 6 in here. That's not what it says in here.  
 7 MR. MARSHALL: Well, that's what it  
 8 says --  
 9 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, I know, but I  
 10 talked to them, too, and they said --  
 11 MR. MARSHALL: Anyway --  
 12 MR. LEIMBACH: It's confusing.  
 13 MR. MARSHALL: Anyway, I'm ready to  
 14 take an oath of office.  
 15 MR. LEIMBACH: So we have a quorum.  
 16 And Donny has already been appointed -- I  
 17 forget what meeting it's been -- in June or  
 18 something. Probably, we can go back in the  
 19 minutes. Because you've got to find it  
 20 then, too, and then before that --  
 21 MR. MARSHALL: I resigned, and I  
 22 understand y'all refused my resignation.  
 23 MR. LEIMBACH: No. We accepted it.  
 24 MR. MARSHALL: Oh, okay. Well --  
 25 MR. JAMISON: All right. But that did

1 not happen in the meeting.  
 2 MR. LEIMBACH: Yes, it did. It's in  
 3 the minutes. It happened before.  
 4 MR. JAMISON: It happened before the  
 5 meeting, didn't it?  
 6 MR. COOPER: No. It happened before  
 7 the last meeting. It happened the week  
 8 before.  
 9 MR. LEIMBACH: He wasn't here to do it  
 10 in person.  
 11 MR. JAMISON: Right, yeah.  
 12 MR. LEIMBACH: You know, nobody  
 13 resigned in person. So that's the thing.  
 14 All we have to do is we just need --  
 15 somebody needs to move that we accept him to  
 16 be appointed. In which group are you? I  
 17 forget now. Five, I think.  
 18 MR. MARSHALL: Five, I think. Group  
 19 one. I'm group one.  
 20 MR. LEIMBACH: Group one. Roddenberry.  
 21 MR. MARSHALL: What it says right  
 22 there. What does yours say?  
 23 MR. LEIMBACH: He is group three. Cal  
 24 must be group five. Is that how it goes?  
 25 MR. JAMISON: Yeah, I'm five.

1 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, I think --  
 2 MR. MARSHALL: There's no money  
 3 involved in you signing this.  
 4 MR. LEIMBACH: Okay. I can sign it.  
 5 MR. JAMISON: That -- it has to be --  
 6 you have to be sworn either in front of a --  
 7 MR. MARSHALL: Then I send \$10 to the  
 8 State.  
 9 MR. LEIMBACH: No. Actually, Cal, it  
 10 says in here I can do it, but since it's  
 11 local and it's easy enough for you to do,  
 12 you can stop by the Board of Elections or  
 13 whatever and just have them do it. Then  
 14 it's all one thing. Because you're going to  
 15 get redone in January.  
 16 MR. MARSHALL: I understand. I have  
 17 got to pay another \$10 in January. Well,  
 18 actually November.  
 19 MR. LEIMBACH: No. No. It says in the  
 20 book the first Tuesday after the first --  
 21 the first Tuesday in January basically,  
 22 which it works out to be, I think it's the  
 23 9th this year, this coming year. That is  
 24 when you take office. Then we'll have a  
 25 meeting like normal and then we'll organize

1 MR. LEIMBACH: That's how it goes.  
 2 Could somebody --  
 3 MR. COOPER: So you want to be on the  
 4 board; right?  
 5 MR. MARSHALL: Yeah, I think I can  
 6 contribute.  
 7 MR. COOPER: I move that we appoint  
 8 Dallas Marshall to the Soil and Water Group.  
 9 MR. LEIMBACH: To finish the term, yes.  
 10 MR. COOPER: To finish the term.  
 11 MR. LEIMBACH: Is there a second?  
 12 MR. MILEY: I second.  
 13 MR. LEIMBACH: All of us in favor?  
 14 (All respond "aye.")  
 15 MR. LEIMBACH: Anybody opposed?  
 16 (No response.)  
 17 MR. LEIMBACH: Makes it unanimous.  
 18 Welcome aboard. Now, if you want to go  
 19 somewhere and get that official and pay the  
 20 money, that's fine and that can be done.  
 21 MR. MARSHALL: You can do it.  
 22 MR. LEIMBACH: I can't collect the  
 23 money. See, that's the problem.  
 24 MR. MARSHALL: No, no. I've got to  
 25 send the money to the State of Florida.

1 it. People will get elected to the  
 2 different positions, and everybody gets.  
 3 And that's where I would like to either have  
 4 the judge come in --  
 5 MR. COOPER: Right.  
 6 MR. LEIMBACH: And/or --  
 7 MR. COOPER: Right, after the  
 8 elections.  
 9 MR. MARSHALL: Let me tell you the way  
 10 it was explained to me.  
 11 MR. LEIMBACH: I know. Dallas, I don't  
 12 want to talk about it anymore. I talked to  
 13 enough people about it.  
 14 MR. MARSHALL: Okay.  
 15 MR. LEIMBACH: This is what it says in  
 16 here. And it -- there is differences of  
 17 opinion and the director of elections said,  
 18 "I'm staying out of this."  
 19 MR. COOPER: Right, he didn't want any  
 20 part of it.  
 21 MR. LEIMBACH: He's got enough  
 22 problems.  
 23 MR. COOPER: So let me make a point of  
 24 order.  
 25 MR. LEIMBACH: Yes.

1 MR. COOPER: Okay? Point of order, we  
2 need to bring this back, get back on track.  
3 You are the chairman. We run under your  
4 rules. So that is my point of order.

5 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah. It's already been  
6 voted and it's done. Welcome aboard. And  
7 we got other business we got to get to.

8 MR. COOPER: Right. Thank you. Thank  
9 you.

10 MR. LEIMBACH: The next thing on the  
11 agenda was the raffle; right?

12 MR. MARSHALL: So you're telling me  
13 we're not going to fill out this form and  
14 send to the Secretary of State?

15 MR. LEIMBACH: I think -- I'm not going  
16 to do it right this minute.

17 MR. MARSHALL: Okay.

18 MR. LEIMBACH: If you're going to want  
19 to go in and have the election people do it,  
20 just go ahead because they are used to doing  
21 it.

22 MR. JAMISON: Well, it says on the form  
23 you can't do it. It says on the form the  
24 person to swear you in is the clerk of the  
25 Court or the supervisor of elections, not

1 apiece, you know, that's a hundred tickets.  
2 So who wants some tickets and how many do  
3 you think you can sell?

4 MR. MARSHALL: I want to look at it  
5 before I commit. Does it clearly say on  
6 there that you've got to take a gun course  
7 and all?

8 MR. COOPER: No. All of that's in the  
9 minutes. We already -- if the guy shows up  
10 with a valid hunting license, that means  
11 he's already taken the thing, he can have  
12 it. If not, he has to bring one in. We  
13 already went through all that.

14 MR. LEIMBACH: And you're going --  
15 that's going to be done.

16 MR. COOPER: Yeah, that is part of --

17 MR. LEIMBACH: If they have a winning  
18 ticket, they get to reaffirm all of that and  
19 that's it.

20 MR. COOPER: So unless there is an  
21 objection, we will go ahead and start  
22 selling the tickets and hopefully we can  
23 have it done by next week.

24 MR. LEIMBACH: The point about this is  
25 none of us are eligible.

1 anybody in this spot. You can appoint him,  
2 but to swear him in, he has to be sworn  
3 in -- either do that form in front of a  
4 notary or be sworn in by the clerk of the  
5 court or the supervisor of elections.  
6 That's the only way.

7 MR. LEIMBACH: And that's -- we're not  
8 going to do that tonight.

9 So what do we have on the fund raiser?  
10 Is that what we're calling it?

11 MR. JAMISON: We are under old  
12 business?

13 MR. LEIMBACH: Very important.

14 MR. JAMISON: Are we on old business  
15 now? It's old business; right?

16 MR. COOPER: Okay. We -- as we said,  
17 we bought a hunting rifle. We paid --  
18 again, I made a donation to the organization  
19 for \$469. The plan was for us to get the  
20 gun, get the tickets. We got the tickets  
21 now and we were going to sell -- the way we  
22 put it the minutes was we were going to sell  
23 100 tickets for \$20 apiece. So we are ready  
24 to start selling tickets. If anybody -- how  
25 many people want to sell -- if we sell 20

1 MR. COOPER: No, nobody --

2 MR. LEIMBACH: And nobody in your  
3 immediate family is either.

4 MR. COOPER: Right. We have to sell  
5 them to the public.

6 MR. LEIMBACH: Yes, it has to be  
7 general public.

8 MR. COOPER: And -- and the way it's  
9 going to work, we're not having a raffle,  
10 we're not having a drawing, per se. We're  
11 giving a prize based on a -- whatever you  
12 want to call it, but the tickets are very  
13 bland, we'll just write on the back the  
14 name, put them in the pot, and then we'll  
15 figure out how the chairman wants to draw  
16 it, or how the committee wants to draw it.  
17 So unless we have -- unless I hear any  
18 different, Mr. Chairman, can we go ahead and  
19 start selling tickets?

20 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, does anybody else  
21 have any input? First thing, I don't even  
22 know. I will take 20 tickets. I don't know  
23 exactly how --

24 MR. COOPER: All we can do is try.

25 MR. LEIMBACH: Because we're going to

1 sell until -- we don't pull it until it's  
 2 all sold.  
 3 MR. COOPER: Until it is all sold.  
 4 Yeah. So if we sell a hundred, I think we  
 5 can do that. Donny, I think we can handle  
 6 that. I know Cal doesn't want to sell any  
 7 tickets. He already made that clear.  
 8 MR. MARSHALL: I've got to look at it  
 9 before I agree to sell, because we've got a  
 10 caveat over there that if they win it,  
 11 they've got to take the gun course. So if I  
 12 sell somebody a ticket, I want to make sure  
 13 they understand that. And if they give it  
 14 away to somebody, then that person might not  
 15 have a gun -- in other words, we have got to  
 16 worry about a communication.  
 17 MR. COOPER: Yeah. So the deal is, to  
 18 just reiterate what's in the minutes and  
 19 what we approved, is if a person shows up  
 20 with a valid Florida hunting license, he  
 21 doesn't have to take a gun course. If he  
 22 can't produce a valid hunting license or a  
 23 safety course, then he will have to show  
 24 back up to pick up the gun with that course  
 25 in hand. That's the way it's in the minutes

1 expensive process.  
 2 MR. LEIMBACH: You are probably going  
 3 to be selling it to people you know, so you  
 4 should be able to communicate with them, I  
 5 would think.  
 6 MR. COOPER: Yeah. I mean, the  
 7 only -- the bottom line is --  
 8 MR. MILEY: Nobody is going to buy  
 9 tickets -- it's a hunting rifle. Nobody is  
 10 going to want it to put it in a gun case, or  
 11 in a gun safe.  
 12 MR. COOPER: So we have already been  
 13 through all this. So all I'm saying is, can  
 14 we go ahead and start selling tickets?  
 15 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, do we want a  
 16 motion for that? Does anybody want to move  
 17 that?  
 18 MR. JAMISON: I move that we start  
 19 selling tickets.  
 20 MR. COOPER: I second it.  
 21 MR. LEIMBACH: Any other discussion?  
 22 All in favor say "aye."  
 23 (All respond "aye.")  
 24 MR. LEIMBACH: Anybody opposed?  
 25 (No response.)

1 right now.  
 2 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, what I'm saying  
 3 is --  
 4 MR. JAMISON: I don't think the minutes  
 5 said hunting license. It said you had to  
 6 show proof of taking a course or be willing  
 7 to take the course.  
 8 MR. COOPER: To get a hunting license,  
 9 you have to take the course. It's a  
 10 prerequisite. But no one that hasn't taken  
 11 a safety course is going to get this gun.  
 12 That's the bottom line.  
 13 MR. LEIMBACH: Would it help you,  
 14 Dallas, if somebody prints out a little  
 15 notice to hand out?  
 16 MR. MARSHALL: Or put a stamp on the  
 17 ticket, so the person holding the ticket is  
 18 on notice of all this.  
 19 MR. LEIMBACH: I don't know if that  
 20 will fit on there. Will it?  
 21 MR. JAMISON: Well, you can probably  
 22 give them a little information.  
 23 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah, I mean, if --  
 24 MR. JAMISON: Not going to be able to  
 25 print it on a ticket unless -- that is an

1 MR. LEIMBACH: That makes it unanimous.  
 2 You still here, Steve?  
 3 MR. TULLER: Yeah.  
 4 MR. LEIMBACH: I forgot to turn my  
 5 phone off.  
 6 Your job is going to be easier, Cal.  
 7 And when we get the corrected minutes, let  
 8 them know when we want to go to the bank. So  
 9 we've got to get that done.  
 10 MR. JAMISON: I can go any time.  
 11 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, I pretty much can,  
 12 too, as long as I get a little lead time.  
 13 MR. JAMISON: But we already have --  
 14 although I noticed on the agenda it said  
 15 something about the -- we already have a  
 16 debit card.  
 17 MR. LEIMBACH: Oh, we do? Good.  
 18 MR. JAMISON: It's in my briefcase;  
 19 we've had it for months.  
 20 MR. COOPER: Mr. Chairman, there is a  
 21 copy of receipt, and the check number, I  
 22 wrote it down there, just in case you need  
 23 it. I have got one, too.  
 24 MR. LEIMBACH: Do you have a place to  
 25 keep these in a safe, I'm assuming?

1 MR. COOPER: We don't have to. I  
 2 don't care if you have it. Just if you need  
 3 it, there it is. I don't care.  
 4 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, we can put it in  
 5 the safe. I have got the key. Do we have  
 6 any blank folders in there?  
 7 MR. JAMISON: I don't think so. I  
 8 haven't looked in there for a while. We  
 9 should go look.  
 10 MR. LEIMBACH: I tell you what, Wayne.  
 11 Keep this for right now.  
 12 MR. COOPER: I will.  
 13 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, I think, can  
 14 you -- you've got to call the bank; right?  
 15 At least Centennial Bank, they won't allow  
 16 you -- sometimes you can go in, sometimes  
 17 you can't. It's just kind of --  
 18 MR. JAMISON: Yeah. I don't know  
 19 whether their lobby is open or not.  
 20 MR. LEIMBACH: You can call them,  
 21 though.  
 22 MR. JAMISON: I have to take a copy of  
 23 the minutes where we've made these changes  
 24 with us when we go.  
 25 MR. LEIMBACH: Can you call them

1 I've got a number of things on the -- on the  
 2 uses of the funds. I've got about 10 items  
 3 down there. Those are just ideas that I had  
 4 that may be examples other people -- and we  
 5 had talked about what we wanted to do -- but  
 6 to make a long story short, if you guys can  
 7 give me your ideas, I can put them back into  
 8 this document and then send them back out  
 9 for everybody to review, and then we can try  
 10 to figure out how to price them or anything  
 11 else you want. But if nobody has any  
 12 ideas -- Cal, I'm sure you've got some ideas  
 13 of what you want to do with the budget;  
 14 right?  
 15 MR. MILEY: I do.  
 16 MR. JAMISON: How much is the budget?  
 17 MR. COOPER: Well, we're looking for a  
 18 budget request, so we need to know how much  
 19 it's going to cost to do whatever you think  
 20 you're going to need done. So I went  
 21 through the handbook and there are some  
 22 things in here that look like -- if anybody  
 23 doesn't have any ideas, for example, Soil  
 24 and Water Conservation District activities:  
 25 Demonstration projects: Restore, augment

1 tomorrow and make sure we get it -- know  
 2 what days they can do it or whatever and  
 3 then let me know? And you can talk to me  
 4 directly on this. There won't be any  
 5 sunshine problem. We've got to get it done.  
 6 And everybody did know Robert passed?  
 7 MR. MARSHALL: Yeah, I knew. Yeah.  
 8 MR. LEIMBACH: I didn't realize he had  
 9 gotten that bad again; he was running around  
 10 pretty good in March, when I saw him last,  
 11 driving and everything. It went bad.  
 12 And I did drop off the plaque. And then  
 13 once I found out why he wasn't answering his  
 14 cell phone, I was embarrassed.  
 15 Next business.  
 16 MR. COOPER: Mr. Chairman, as the  
 17 budget or grant request, is that old  
 18 business?  
 19 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah.  
 20 MR. COOPER: Okay.  
 21 MR. LEIMBACH: We are ready.  
 22 MR. COOPER: Here is a copy of what I  
 23 sent out before I knew you already got it.  
 24 But we had agreed that we would put -- bring  
 25 five ideas to the table today. And if --

1 and improve the water resource and ecology,  
 2 that seems to me that something that Cal  
 3 would be interested in and Donny would be  
 4 interested in, you know. Habitat  
 5 restoration: I thought for sure about  
 6 Donny, and I even thought about what Dallas  
 7 had said to me a while back about some  
 8 wetlands. So there are ideas in this -- in  
 9 this supervised handbook if you look at them  
 10 good.  
 11 One of my ideas was to have us act as a  
 12 go-between between the Planning and Zoning  
 13 Commission and the county commissioners for  
 14 any development that might have an impact on  
 15 the water quality.  
 16 So I got to looking and under planning  
 17 and rule making on district activities, there  
 18 is -- we can provide input as a liaison  
 19 between the community interest groups, local  
 20 authorities and regulatory entities. So right  
 21 there is where that fits into: Is this an  
 22 activity that we could partake in?  
 23 MR. JAMISON: And after you brought  
 24 that up the last time, I spoke to someone in  
 25 planning, and she was open to that and

1 willing to come to one of our meetings and  
 2 speak with us. She talked about how we  
 3 could --  
 4 MR. COOPER: And I do so that -- I  
 5 really do see that right up your alley.  
 6 Right now, people are finally starting to  
 7 understand the expertise that you bring to  
 8 the table. It would be an excellent time  
 9 for us to take on an issue, go in there and  
 10 see how it works. If we need, you know, a  
 11 lobbyist, we'll worry about that later, but  
 12 you would be our -- you know, you could be  
 13 the input man. I know Donny wouldn't have a  
 14 problem. I am sure Dallas wouldn't have a  
 15 problem, or if any of you guys were doing  
 16 that.  
 17 But what I have on here is nine items,  
 18 which we can scratch off, do whatever we want  
 19 to do, but the one that I'm most interested in  
 20 is the first one on this -- on this sheet:  
 21 The Development of the Comprehensive Water  
 22 Flow Characteristic Digital Map.  
 23 So I started thinking about that -- and,  
 24 Cal, this is something that I wanted to talk  
 25 to you about -- but what I had in mind was at

1 impact is fixing to do down here, then if we  
 2 were to walk into the planning commission and  
 3 we were to walk into the county commission, we  
 4 would be able to say, "Hell, let me just show  
 5 you what I'm talking about." Or "Here is some  
 6 runoff, let me pour some runoff in here. Let  
 7 me show you what happens. Oh, it doesn't go  
 8 into your damn holding pond. It actually goes  
 9 into your drinking water."  
 10 And that was my idea. So that's the one  
 11 that I like the most. So I'll put that on the  
 12 table and put it in the budget request.  
 13 MR. JAMISON: Well, I think you can  
 14 talk about a budget request to build a model  
 15 like that or -- because you are re-inventing  
 16 the wheel.  
 17 MR. COOPER: We may not have to build  
 18 it.  
 19 MR. JAMISON: Well, not county  
 20 specific, but there are models in place that  
 21 show you what happens when the water goes in  
 22 the sinkhole and gets in the aquifer and  
 23 goes and comes up. There is, you know,  
 24 these -- I have seen them. I don't know  
 25 who's got one right now, but they've got

1 first I was thinking about we did it with a  
 2 computer, but then I started thinking about  
 3 all of the 3D printers that we have available  
 4 to us, now -- and I think it could be awesome  
 5 if we had a table this size and underneath  
 6 this table was the aquifer and all of the  
 7 connections that you know of, that we know of  
 8 or FSU, whoever, knows of -- and it resides  
 9 under the table. On top of the table, we  
 10 would have a map of Wakulla County, all the  
 11 buildings, all the roads, a model.  
 12 And to make a long story short, if a  
 13 developer came in and said, "I want to build  
 14 right here. I want to take up a hundred  
 15 acres, and I'm not going to do this, I'm going  
 16 to do that, I'm going to do this and do that;"  
 17 if we were able to take this 3D map that we've  
 18 got and say, "Let me show you what happens  
 19 when you do that. All of this used to absorb  
 20 water, now we're going to put concrete here,  
 21 we're going to pour it on, and this is what is  
 22 going to happen to the water and the water is  
 23 going to flow into the hole." You see where  
 24 I'm going? It's not a great example, but if  
 25 you could show a developer exactly what the

1 them where you can pour the water in and you  
 2 can watch it. So that part of it, if we  
 3 can --  
 4 MR. COOPER: Right.  
 5 MR. JAMISON: That's already done.  
 6 MR. COOPER: Right.  
 7 MR. JAMISON: Part of what you're  
 8 talking about, we can do with the Light-R  
 9 imaging, the Light-R mapping.  
 10 MR. COOPER: Right.  
 11 MR. JAMISON: You can't really use it  
 12 to build a model, but I think we can use it  
 13 to demonstrate, kind of use it to  
 14 demonstrate what you're talking about.  
 15 MR. COOPER: Right.  
 16 MR. MILEY: We need it for  
 17 educational purposes because if people  
 18 aren't educated on what the real issues are,  
 19 they don't care. And this county has got a  
 20 lot of people that don't know what's  
 21 actually going on in it.  
 22 MR. MARSHALL: Are you-all familiar  
 23 with what the technical coordinating  
 24 committee is? It's a county -- whenever you  
 25 get a sight plan or a project approved, it

1 goes before the sight selection committee.  
2 It's a coordinating committee. There is a  
3 member on there, the head of the sewer  
4 department, the head of the fire department  
5 and the ambulance department. And the head  
6 of the engineering department to -- so all  
7 of the infrastructure that's available to  
8 support this development is already  
9 represented by heads of these departments.

10 MR. COOPER: Right.

11 MR. MARSHALL: And somebody from the  
12 health department is there.

13 MR. COOPER: Right. So what is your  
14 point?

15 MR. MARSHALL: We might want to try to  
16 get a seat at that table.

17 MR. COOPER: That is what I'm saying.  
18 That's what I'm saying.

19 MR. MARSHALL: But that is the  
20 technical coordinating committee.

21 MR. COOPER: Right, that is exactly  
22 what I'm saying.

23 MR. MARSHALL: That you go in and you  
24 give the technical coordinating committee  
25 the impact of this development on the water

1 resources.

2 MR. COOPER: But I believe that we  
3 insert ourselves not on that committee, but  
4 as a stand-alone entity that we insert  
5 ourselves immediately upon -- before the  
6 vote. So what I'm saying is the people that  
7 are -- those people, nobody listens to them,  
8 anyway. The fact of the matter is, the  
9 planning and zoning commission has never  
10 once said, no, and had that "no" stick. You  
11 know, I mean, the point is the county  
12 commission and the planning department don't  
13 work together. So I think we should keep it  
14 as an independent portion of ourselves,  
15 represent the quality of the water and the  
16 land exclusively instead of -- instead of  
17 throwing in this, you know, the little  
18 special interests like this, because those  
19 guys don't -- they're not effective.

20 MR. LEIMBACH: I think he's got a point  
21 and trying to get involved in the system,  
22 one way or another, is a good thing. But I  
23 think -- I still think that the computer --  
24 like our -- you've got everything for the  
25 county already.

1 MR. COOPER: Right.

2 MR. LEIMBACH: And then all the  
3 property appraiser just needs to lay it on  
4 top of everything and it's done.

5 MR. COOPER: Exactly what I'm talking  
6 about.

7 MR. LEIMBACH: And I -- I'm not young  
8 but I can visualize the computer thing  
9 without much trouble. And it wouldn't -- if  
10 we -- we might be able to develop something  
11 else computer generated to do exactly what  
12 you're saying, but do it mechanically.

13 MR. COOPER: Right. Because all of us  
14 on this group share that same common  
15 interest, no doubt about it: Clean water,  
16 clean soil. So that one -- that's --  
17 anyway, that's my idea. I don't want to  
18 take up the whole time.

19 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah. Well, I think --

20 MR. COOPER: I'd like to keep that in  
21 the budget.

22 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, we have four each,  
23 and they have projects to teach the kids  
24 this stuff. And you've to get them young.

25 MR. COOPER: Right. That's right.

1 MR. LEIMBACH: I'd be glad to try to  
2 talk to Rachel Pienta and see what's  
3 available. I've been out of 4-H for so  
4 long. When I was a kid, in 4-H, there was  
5 always a project for everything.

6 MR. COOPER: So I'm just going down  
7 the list of my wish list. So can I leave  
8 number one in?

9 MR. LEIMBACH: Oh, yeah.

10 MR. COOPER: Okay. Number two, the  
11 development of the scholarship program that  
12 encourages Wakulla's youth to continue their  
13 education in the soil and water  
14 environmental field. Now, we've already  
15 done that a couple times in the last two  
16 years, but we weren't specific. We were  
17 just -- we picked out some kids and we did  
18 this and that. So that's a very simple  
19 thing. If we have money and we can set up a  
20 program, we might be able to give them \$2.  
21 So the question is, can I keep that in the  
22 budget request as an activity?

23 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, but I think when  
24 we do that, we need to have an endowment and  
25 that means we have to have a 501(c), which I



1 know it's not hard to do, but you've got to  
2 maintain it, which also isn't hard to do,  
3 you've just got to remember to file the  
4 forms at the right time.

5 MR. JAMISON: All right. Tell me that  
6 again. Tell me what number two is again.

7 MR. COOPER: Number two, is setting  
8 aside some funds for young kids in Wakulla  
9 County who want to pursue their career in  
10 soil and water management of some form or  
11 fashion. That could be farming, that could  
12 be this, could be anything. But we'd vote  
13 on it, of course, but just -- I want to tell  
14 the State, the Governor, that we want to  
15 give out some money for kids that are  
16 interested in doing -- some day being on the  
17 Soil and Water Conservation Board of  
18 Supervisors.

19 MR. JAMISON: We can -- I can see us  
20 being able to do some of that by supporting  
21 some of those activities that are already in  
22 place.

23 MR. COOPER: Right, like 4-H and all  
24 those.

25 MR. JAMISON: The 4-H, the Junior

1 about hiring a lobbyist, I don't think today  
2 would be the day for it, but I was going to  
3 take it out.

4 MR. LEIMBACH: We'll postpone it, yes.

5 MR. COOPER: For the time being, I  
6 will just take it out.

7 MR. LEIMBACH: It's a good idea, but I  
8 think --

9 MR. COOPER: I'll leave it on there.  
10 Cal is, like, I'd never even get to number  
11 three. All right. Number four --

12 MR. MILEY: I forwarded you an email.  
13 Could you forward it to the guys?

14 MR. TULLER: Sure, absolutely.

15 MR. MILEY: Thank you.

16 MR. COOPER: And, number four, this is  
17 kind of what we talked about in number  
18 one -- actually, not really. Number one,  
19 was the development of the flow, but the  
20 creation of an expert panel of advisers to  
21 assist private developers -- and when I say  
22 that, I mean out of this panel right here,  
23 so I need to be more specific, obviously.

24 And this is exactly what I was talking  
25 about. "Work with and in between the Wakulla

1 Ranger Program at Wakulla Springs, the  
2 learning at Florida's environment that they  
3 do at the middle schools at Wakulla,  
4 supporting those --

5 MR. COOPER: Right. That's exactly  
6 what I'm talking about.

7 MR. JAMISON: So those kind of  
8 activities that are already -- they are  
9 already in place and working.

10 MR. COOPER: So can I leave number two  
11 in?

12 MR. LEIMBACH: Yes.

13 MR. COOPER: Okay.

14 MR. LEIMBACH: There is also -- we are  
15 supposed to be promoting a poster contest.  
16 Remember, we went to the thing and everybody  
17 else's groups had the kids' posters.  
18 That's -- 4-H does that. Most soil and  
19 water projects end up having a poster so  
20 they can explain, and that would be  
21 something they'd get a prize for.

22 MR. COOPER: All right. Going on down  
23 the list, my wish list, number three I think  
24 I would just like to forget about that for a  
25 while. Unless somebody really wants to talk

1 Board of County Commissioners and the Wakulla  
2 Planning and Zoning Board to ensure the  
3 potential developments address the concerns of  
4 the environment using science as a base for  
5 granting permits," can I leave that in there?

6 MR. COOPER: Wow. 2100 gallons?  
7 That's cool.

8 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah. Well, it hasn't  
9 rained in the town of Panacea for another  
10 three or four weeks and it got all used up.  
11 The other night we had a half-inch of rain,  
12 it went up a couple hundred gallons. I  
13 mean, it's -- the trouble is in this  
14 environment, you can't bury a cistern very  
15 well, because it will come up out of the  
16 ground.

17 MR. COOPER: It will swim, like a  
18 fiberglass swimming pool.

19 MR. LEIMBACH: Even a concrete pool  
20 will come up. Septic tanks come up.  
21 Really. So you have to have above ground.  
22 But they can be -- they don't have to be an  
23 eyesore. Just the small rain barrels that  
24 people get -- I don't know if they have up  
25 here, but my idea -- the biggest idea is we

1 need to partner with 4-H. We don't have  
2 FFA, so that's not -- but the other  
3 environmental groups, Friends of the  
4 Springs, whatever, try to get synergy going.  
5 And I think Tabatha was her name, the gal  
6 from the -- she's the one who said if you  
7 ever actually get to do anything that gets  
8 money, you need to partner with somebody  
9 else to take care of the money. It makes it  
10 easier.

11 I don't know exactly who else we would  
12 have around here that would be interested  
13 in --

14 MR. COOPER: Well, you know, Leon  
15 County soil and water group, they -- I mean  
16 there is a lady down there that calls me  
17 once a month to see if we need anything or  
18 anything like that. And, you know, that  
19 right there, that is a good starting point.  
20 Because they share the biggest part of the  
21 concern that we have at Wakulla Springs;  
22 right?

23 MR. LEIMBACH: And it also says in the  
24 book, supervisors should go to other  
25 people's meetings and learn from everybody

1 else. You know, it's like, yeah, in our  
2 spare time, we get paid so much. But that's  
3 the thing to do. But try keeping -- and  
4 that's why going to these other meetings,  
5 they are around, we need to go. But as I  
6 said, my thing would be to just add on more  
7 of those things about we need to partner  
8 with the other organizations.

9 MR. COOPER: All right. Anything  
10 else? So did you send those to Steve, those  
11 ideas that you have there?

1 MR. MARSHALL: Okay.

2 MR. COOPER: So, Dallas, since you

3 haven't had a chance to review the

4 supervisors' handbook, do you want us to

5 wait until next month and you'll bring your

6 ideas to the table?

7 MR. MARSHALL: Well, I -- when I first

8 got interested in getting on this committee,

9 I went on and read it, and if -- I mean, we

10 can take title of real estate.

11 MR. COOPER: Right. That's right.

12 MR. MARSHALL: We can sell it, make a

4 are fighting about them, if you can get

5 control of that, you could trade it to the

6 federal government for land -- like for

7 instance, that close to a community.

8 MR. COOPER: So is that one of your

9 suggestions? Is that what --

10 MR. MARSHALL: I believe we need to --

11 I don't see why we couldn't be an

12 intermediary like a nature conservancy and

13 when the State is not ready to purchase

14 something, you know, maybe you can put it

15 down in somebody's will or something. I

16 mean, to be the stewards of the land,

17 there's a lot of families that would like to

18 see that.

19 MR. COOPER: Yeah. Well, we can

20 absolutely buy and sell land. We can hold

21 land, we can own property, we can do

22 anything we want to do. But for right now

23 we're just trying to get some ideas in the

24 budget. Is that something you'd like to put

25 in there?

1 clue what to do with it.

2 MR. COOPER: Well, I have a

3 proposition for you.

4 MR. MARSHALL: But we can take title to

5 a residential lot.

6 MR. COOPER: Yeah.

7 MR. MARSHALL: And we can trade it to

8 the County for a holding pond when they pave

9 the roads, you know.

10 MR. COOPER: I have a proposition for

11 you to make it clearer of -- if you could

12 find a piece of property out there that

13 needs to be saved for the environment

14 instead of for development, you might want

15 to throw that into this document and

16 specifically talk about what could be done

17 with that property such as conservation,

18 conservation and conservation.

19 MR. MARSHALL: Well, I see it all the

20 time, especially end (phonetic)holdings out

21 here, where a family has got a hunting camp,

22 and the federal or state government has come

23 around and bought out everything around it,

24 and they've got to go in there and try a

25 control burn, and they can't do it because

1 MR. MARSHALL: Well, I would like to do

2 some research on other districts and if the

3 Legislature funds any of those, is there any

4 budget requests? Are they all grant money?

5 Or does the Legislature fund some of these

6 others? So the first thing I'm going to do

7 is try to educate myself as to: Are we

8 missing out on getting State funds somehow,

9 you know?

10 MR. COOPER: Well, right now what

11 we're trying to do is respond to Executive

12 Order 1912 from the Governor which is \$2.5

13 billion, and we missed the deadline because

14 we didn't have a quorum, and so we couldn't

15 get it done, and we didn't think it was

16 right to really put our ideas in there when

17 there's two vacant seats and not know what

18 those ideas were. So right now we're kind

19 of trying to -- even though we missed the

20 deadline, I have already been advised that

21 he takes these all year long, and so

22 whenever we get it in, we should at least

23 submit it. Who knows if there will be any

24 money left by then? But if they do, we're

25 going to go after it. And then, we're going

1 to also use the same document to get all  
 2 partners such as the county commissioner.  
 3 So is that your idea --  
 4 MR. MARSHALL: I would like to see it  
 5 get involved in creating transactions,  
 6 whether it be a conservation easement or  
 7 taking title of property and then turning  
 8 around and marketing it and creating money  
 9 for a scholarship, or whatever. But myself,  
 10 I'm a single man, I have no children. When  
 11 I die, I have got nothing to leave it to,  
 12 you know, so it's going to go to TCC or the  
 13 rec park, but if the public knew that there  
 14 was a vehicle out there that they could  
 15 leave their property to, you know -- it's  
 16 worth researching, I think.  
 17 MR. COOPER: Would you mind --  
 18 MR. MARSHALL: I would be glad to --  
 19 MR. COOPER: Would you mind writing  
 20 these ideas up and sending them to Steve so  
 21 would we could get them in the budget?  
 22 MR. MARSHALL: Okay. All right.  
 23 MR. COOPER: Cal.  
 24 MR. LEIMBACH: Going back to that, I  
 25 think your idea of holding ponds and Wakulla

1 before we get to my house where we didn't  
 2 let them pave the road.  
 3 MR. MARSHALL: I should have said  
 4 retention areas instead of holding ponds  
 5 because they do use ditches and all for  
 6 retention areas.  
 7 MR. JAMISON: But the -- to do and  
 8 justify what the purchase of the properties,  
 9 what are you -- I like your idea, but they

 11 for that parcel, there has to be some kind  
 12 of threat, or some kind of -- you can't just  
 13 go buy some lot in Wakulla Gardens that Joe  
 14 Schmo owns and he doesn't want it any more.  
 15 MR. COOPER: I mean, you can but it  
 16 wouldn't make any sense. It wouldn't do any  
 17 good, and the State wouldn't help you do  
 18 that. So we're just looking for things that  
 19 the State can help us with right now.  
 20 MR. JAMISON: Right, yeah. And then we  
 21 can also assist in what you were talking  
 22 about with the conservation easements. See,  
 23 like the Water Management District is in  
 24 negotiations with Guy Revel right now for  
 25 conservation easement on his property.

1 Gardens and all the gardens up there is a  
 2 great idea because then once that starts  
 3 getting paved, that's one-tenth-acre lots.  
 4 MR. MARSHALL: One of the reasons they  
 5 are slow to pave those streets is because  
 6 they are creating a pervious surface and  
 7 they have to capture all that.  
 8 MR. LEIMBACH: Oh, I know. And they  
 9 also have to put a sewer system.

 11 to go condemn four lots and build a holding

 22 Beechwood, it doesn't stand in the ditches  
 23 at all. There is one spot in my road that  
 24 holds water because the road goes down  
 25 through the bottom of the sink hole. But

1 MR. MARSHALL: I think that is a done  
 2 deal now, isn't it?  
 3 MR. JAMISON: What?  
 4 MR. MARSHALL: I think that's a done  
 5 deal if I'm not mistaken.  
 6 MR. JAMISON: Well, they haven't  
 7 admitted to it yet.

 5 MR. MARSHALL: Oh, a Zoom meeting.  
 6 MR. JAMISON: Yeah, there was that.  
 7 And just -- actually this might fall under,  
 8 I guess, old business. At the Friends of  
 9 Wakulla Springs board meeting the other  
 10 night -- and we didn't get to have the  
 11 presentation, but the CRPTA, the Capital  
 12 Region Transportation Planning Authority is  
 13 going ahead with the spur bike/walking,  
 14 bicycling and walking trail from the St.  
 15 Mark's Trail to Wakulla Springs State Park.  
 16 And it will be coming down Bloxham Cutoff  
 17 and crossing over McBride Slough, which we  
 18 talked about one time. And, actually, I'm  
 19 supposed to write them a letter or I was  
 20 supposed to write them a letter expressing  
 21 our interest and involvement, but we've  
 22 had -- we've had two chairman changes since  
 23 then.  
 24 Anyway, I haven't been able to send it  
 25 because of all of our flux that we have been

1 having, so at some point I'll get that out.  
2 But they are still -- they're going forward  
3 with the plan to bring it to -- I think to the  
4 entrance of Wakulla Springs State Park. They  
5 might bring it in some other place into the  
6 park off of Bloxham Cutoff. But I don't know  
7 yet.

8 But anyway, that is going forward. So  
9 what we're going to be interested in watching  
10 is what they plan to do, how they plan to  
11 cross McBride Slough, because they'll be  
12 putting in 40 to 50 pilings down in there that  
13 go 20 feet into the ground. And it depends on  
14 where the cave system is, like on Highway 98  
15 when they put those pilings in down there. So  
16 anyway that's -- that's happening.

17 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, does -- your Lidar  
18 system is already there. You can show them.

19 MR. JAMISON: Yeah.

20 MR. LEIMBACH: They've got to look,  
21 though.

22 MR. JAMISON: Yeah. The problem is  
23 that really has to happen in the planning  
24 stages and not when they are there with a

1 there is State land along there.

5 MR. JAMISON: No. But we just need to  
6 stay on -- just stay on top of it and let  
7 them know that we're watching.

8 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, yeah, they need to  
9 look at that.

10 MR. JAMISON: And I have -- me and Rene  
11 Murray who is also on The Friends of the  
12 board, and Dale Allen who has been pushing  
13 this trail for CRPTA, has been working in  
14 that for a long time, he's on the board,  
15 Friends of the Springs board, too. So I'm  
16 on that committee. I volunteered to be on  
17 the -- on that bike trail committee coming  
18 to Wakulla Springs. So that will keep us --  
19 that will keep our group in the mix. We'll  
20 be able to bring our views into that.

21 MR. LEIMBACH: Well, there is -- the  
22 State land comes all the way over there to  
23 Rock Road; right?

24 MR. JAMISON: Yeah. Well, there is --  
25 some of it on the south end of Rock Road

1 MR. MILEY: They don't want to go  
2 straight.

3 MR. LEIMBACH: No. They want to have a  
4 scenic route, they want to have shade.

5 MR. JAMISON: If you go off those  
6 trails off of Rock Road, there is lots of  
7 good bike riding places back there, and  
8 River Sink too. It's definitely not a lot  
9 of paved.

10 MR. LEIMBACH: Hopefully, maybe -- you  
11 know, there needs to be input to the  
12 station. Think outside of the box.

13 MR. JAMISON: Yeah.

14 MR. LEIMBACH: And if they don't have  
15 to build a bridge, they can put in a lot of  
16 bike trail, regular bike trail. The bridge  
17 costs a crap load.

18 MR. JAMISON: Yeah. So where are we on  
19 the --

20 MR. LEIMBACH: What else was on? I  
21 don't think --

22 MR. JAMISON: Is it time for the  
23 Springs update?

24 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah, I think we are  
25 ready.

1 MR. JAMISON: Which is -- okay. So I  
 2 went out over Wakulla Springs boil this  
 3 morning as every Thursday morning. And the  
 4 SECCHI disk, which we lowered that down,  
 5 it's a white disk.  
 6 MR. COOPER: What's it called?  
 7 MR. JAMISON: S-E-C-C-H-I, SECCHI disk.  
 8 MR. COOPER: That's where you --  
 9 that's a collection device.  
 10 MR. JAMISON: It's black-and-white disk  
 11 just divided into quarters, black-and-white  
 12 pattern on a tape measure that you roll  
 13 down, and you get it down to where it goes  
 14 out of sight. Then you bring it back up  
 15 until you --  
 16 MR. COOPER: Can see it?  
 17 MR. JAMISON: Not when you first see  
 18 it, but when you can discern the pattern.  
 19 MR. COOPER: Okay.  
 20 MR. JAMISON: So today the reading was  
 21 15 feet even, was all the further we could  
 22 see down off of the boat.

 9 though it's not raining at your house, it's  
 10 raining out there in Tate's Hell or it's  
 11 raining -- coming up from Tate's Hell to go to  
 12 Brad Willow Bay to, you know.  
 13 So the water is still tannic. The water  
 14 flow is down a little bit from last week.  
 15 According to the Water Management District in  
 16 the article that was in today's paper, did you  
 17 see the article about Wakulla Springs? Big  
 18 article on the front page about the water flow  
 19 of Wakulla Springs.  
 20 MR. COOPER: Yes, I did see that.  
 21 MR. JAMISON: Has increased over the  
 22 last few years.  
 23 MR. COOPER: That's what I was talking  
 24 about, yeah.  
 25 MR. JAMISON: So the Water Management

1 It's a little better. Let me find the  
 2 message here. Okay. Back on July 30th, you  
 3 could see down 29 feet, all right? And then  
 4 August 28th, you could see down 12.9 feet.  
 5 And last Thursday we could see down  
 6 9.5 feet. And then this, today, we could  
 7 see down 15.  
 8 Now, the reason that that's happening is  
 9 for the last five days we haven't had much  
 10 measurable rain. And even though all of the  
 11 creeks are flowing and they all Fisher Creek,  
 12 Black Creek, Junk Creek, Lost Creek all have  
 13 good strong flows right now, so the water is  
 14 still going down into the cases. But the flow  
 15 is diminished a little bit, so it's not as  
 16 much tannic water as going in and coming out  
 17 of Wakulla Springs as it was last week. If  
 18 the -- tomorrow and the next few days the rain  
 19 chances are supposed to increase. So if that  
 20 happens and the creeks pick back up again,  
 21 then next week we will see -- or you could see  
 22 Wakulla Springs get darker or lighter  
 23 depending on what the rainfall is. And the  
 24 rainfall doesn't -- it's not the rainfall that  
 25 falls here or it's not the rainfall that falls

1 District is going to use that as a  
 2 justification to withdraw more water.  
 3 MR. COOPER: I was wondering what that  
 4 was all about.  
 5 MR. JAMISON: So when they made their  
 6 presentation to the WSA at that last Zoom  
 7 meeting, they got a lot of pushback about  
 8 the former -- former head of the Water  
 9 Management District, Doug Barr is on our  
 10 board there, and he was -- was just about on  
 11 the point of being rude, talking to Carlos,  
 12 talking to a couple people from the Water  
 13 Management District. But, anyway, so there  
 14 is a lot of controversy about the data that  
 15 they presented at the last meeting and at  
 16 this one that I -- the agenda that you  
 17 should have just gotten or will get,  
 18 Kathleen Coates is going to talk about how  
 19 they came up with the minimum flow data,  
 20 because they didn't do what they said --  
 21 they didn't use the models that they said  
 22 they were going to use. So, anyway -- and  
 23 that's as far as -- but as far as the Spring  
 24 Shed update goes, all of the sink holes are  
 25 still -- are still tannic, the swamps -- and

1 if you look at the roadside ditches and  
 2 things on the south end of the county are  
 3 still pretty high, pretty flooded. North  
 4 end of the county is starting to slow down a  
 5 little bit. That's it.  
 6 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah, in Panacea the  
 7 ponds are all up. They go down quick.  
 8 MR. JAMISON: Yeah.  
 9 MR. COOPER: What else we got?  
 10 MR. JAMISON: I don't think there is  
 11 anything else.  
 12 MR. COOPER: I have one other thing.  
 13 Would you mind assigning someone on this  
 14 committee to get us some ID cards? Because  
 15 as Cal was just talking, you know, I  
 16 remember working as a -- as a -- I started  
 17 out at Wakulla Springs in the ninth or tenth  
 18 grade and I was driving tractors and feeding  
 19 animals, and I got to travel on every bit of  
 20 that property that they owned in there,  
 21 every trail. There is some beautiful stuff  
 22 in there that nobody ever sees. You get to  
 23 see it, but not -- I mean, there are some  
 24 things that -- you know, right out of  
 25 heaven. We need to get an ID card so that

1 MR. COOPER: Can I take a look at  
 2 that?  
 3 MR. JAMISON: No. This is mine.  
 4 MR. LEIMBACH: Would Charlene might  
 5 know something about this?  
 6 MR. TULLER: Possibility. But if Cal  
 7 could take a picture of the card.  
 8 MR. COOPER: Secretary of State.  
 9 MR. TULLER: Get it out, I will look  
 10 into it. I know the Secretary of State is  
 11 responsible for maintaining the soil and  
 12 water districts, and if it was a State card,  
 13 it ought to include the Department of  
 14 Agriculture and Consumer Services, Office of  
 15 Ag Water Policy. That is who should be  
 16 doing it.  
 17 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah, because according  
 18 to the book --  
 19 MR. JAMISON: According to the book, we  
 20 are supposed to have a seal and all kinds of  
 21 stuff. I would like to see us have an  
 22 official ID that looks like a State ID so  
 23 that you --  
 24 MR. COOPER: That would be phenomenal.  
 25 MR. JAMISON: So you can walk into the

1 all of us can go around and in places like  
 2 this because we can get in there with that  
 3 card, with a card. "All you have to do is  
 4 give us a call, we'll be happy to work with  
 5 you, we're going to need some form of ID."  
 6 MR. LEIMBACH: Yeah. Steve, do you  
 7 know anything about getting IDs?  
 8 MR. TULLER: You know what? I know  
 9 name tags, but it seems like Cal had one.  
 10 Am I right about that, Cal?  
 11 MR. JAMISON: I have one that I had got  
 12 when I was elected the first time.  
 13 MR. TULLER: Was it the Department of  
 14 State or --  
 15 MR. JAMISON: Yeah, it's from the  
 16 Secretary of State's Office. But there is  
 17 no -- I tried. I investigated it to try to  
 18 find out who the hell printed the damn  
 19 thing, you know, but I wasn't able to find  
 20 any information on it. I did -- where the  
 21 heck is that? I did talk to our supervisor  
 22 of elections, and he said that he was going  
 23 to investigate that, and I don't think that  
 24 he ever has. I was going to ask him when I  
 25 went down there to get sworn in.

1 office buildings without, you know, having  
 2 to sell your firstborn child.  
 3 MR. COOPER: That right there would do  
 4 it. That from the Secretary of State, that  
 5 would work.  
 6 MR. TULLER: Another way I would have  
 7 to look, the National Association of  
 8 Conservation Districts has some of that  
 9 stuff. It's not quite coming from the  
 10 individual states, but recognizes you as  
 11 part of a national association of  
 12 conservation districts. And, like I said,  
 13 they have really nice magnets, IDs, nametag  
 14 things that explain the Soil and Water  
 15 Conservation District and your name and  
 16 position. So, you know, that might be one  
 17 of the things. I think they also have some  
 18 type of ID card.  
 19 MR. JAMISON: What does Leon County do?  
 20 MR. LEIMBACH: Do you have any idea  
 21 what Leon -- you don't do Leon County, do  
 22 you, Steve?  
 23 MR. TULLER: Yeah, I do. I do.  
 24 MR. LEIMBACH: Do they have cards?  
 25 MR. TULLER: Name tags.

1 MR. LEIMBACH: They have ID cards?  
 2 MR. TULLER: No, not that I know of.  
 3 I don't think any of them have ID cards.  
 4 MR. JAMISON: Yeah, even one of those  
 5 name, if you just have Dusty Leimbach,  
 6 Wakulla Soil and Water Conservation.  
 7 MR. COOPER: That one that you got  
 8 worked from the Secretary of State. If we  
 9 had one of those, those would be nice.  
 10 So anyway, who do you want to do it?  
 11 MR. JAMISON: Steve, I sent you that  
 12 picture of that card.  
 13 MR. LEIMBACH: I mean, I can certainly  
 14 try to call people.  
 15 MR. COOPER: So you'll do it?  
 16 MR. LEIMBACH: I will do it.  
 17 MR. COOPER: I don't have anything  
 18 else.  
 19 MR. LEIMBACH: If I run into trouble, I  
 20 will call somebody.  
 21 MR. COOPER: We'll all pitch in. No  
 22 other business being on the table, I move  
 23 that we adjourn.  
 24 MR. MARSHALL: I've got one more thing.  
 25 The Wakulla newspaper every week prints a

1 calendar of events, and they had the  
 2 Planning Commission and the Zoning Board and  
 3 the Tourist Development Council. Do you  
 4 think the public would be any interest in  
 5 finding out when we have our meetings or  
 6 anything?  
 7 MR. COOPER: Sure. I would.  
 8 MR. MARSHALL: Do you think we ought to  
 9 start notifying the Wakulla News of our  
 10 meeting dates?  
 11 MR. LEIMBACH: Would you like to  
 12 volunteer to do that?  
 13 MR. MARSHALL: Well, if y'all want me  
 14 to, I will.  
 15 MR. MILEY: I think that would be  
 16 good.  
 17 MR. COOPER: That would be fantastic.  
 18 MR. MARSHALL: I'll volunteer.  
 19 MR. LEIMBACH: Does anybody else have  
 20 anything else?  
 21 MR. COOPER: I move we adjourn.  
 22 MR. LEIMBACH: Need a second.  
 23 MR. MILEY: I second it.  
 24 MR. LEIMBACH: All of those in favor.  
 25 (All respond "aye.")
