But what I have on here is nine items, which we can scratch off, do whatever we want to do, but the one that I'm most interested in is the first one on this -- on this sheet:

The Development of the Comprehensive Water Flow Characteristic Digital Map.

So I started thinking about that -- and, Cal, this is something that I wanted to talk to you about -- but what I had in mind was at

first I was thinking about we did it with a computer, but then I started thinking about all of the 3D printers that we have available to us, now -- and I think it could be awesome if we had a table this size and underneath this table was the aquifer and all of the connections that you know of, that we know of or FSU, whoever, knows of -- and it resides under the table. On top of the table, we would have a map of Wakulla County, all the buildings, all the roads, a model.

And to make a long story short, if a developer came in and said, "I want to build right here. I want to take up a hundred acres, and I'm not going to do this, I'm going to do that, I'm going to do this and do that;" if we were able to take this 3D map that we've got and say, "Let me show you what happens when you do that. All of this used to absorb water, now we're going to put concrete here, we're going to pour it on, and this is what is going to happen to the water and the water is going to flow into the hole." You see where I'm going? It's not a great example, but if you could show a developer exactly what the

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impact is fixing to do down here, then if we were to walk into the planning commission and we were to walk into the county commission, we would be able to say, "Hell, let me just show you what I'm talking about." Or "Here is some runoff, let me pour some runoff in here. Let me show you what happens. Oh, it doesn't go into your damn holding pond. It actually goes into your drinking water."

And that was my idea. So that's the one that I like the most. So I'll put that on the table and put it in the budget request.

MR. JAMISON: Well, I think you can talk about a budget request to build a model like that or -- because you are re-inventing the wheel.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MR}}.$ COOPER: We may not have to build it.

MR. JAMISON: Well, not county specific, but there are models in place that show you what happens when the water goes in the sinkhole and gets in the aquifer and goes and comes up. There is, you know, these -- I have seen them. I don't know who's got one right now, but they've got

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them where you can pour the water in and you can watch it. So that part of it, if we can --

MR. COOPER: Right.

MR. JAMISON: That's already done.

MR. COOPER: Right.

I saw a thing on Facebook that said, oh, fantastic news, Wakulla Springs has regained its glory, it's now pumping twice as much as it ever did, and I was like, "Yeah, but what's it pumping?" You know, I mean, it

you can't drink it, you know.

So, anyway, the last thing I would like to put in there is to actually look at the creation of cisterns, any type of evaporation that we might be able to do, runoff, capturing runoff, anything to create sustainable water.

The first idea that I had was something that's used in very dry countries, is the capture of water out of the air, and it's actually becoming cost effective -- excuse me. It's never been cost effective. Feasible to pump out, say, 10,000 gallons a day from the air.

Now, I brought this up before, and Cal pointed out the obvious, guess where that water would have gone if you hadn't sucked it out? It goes into the aquifer.

So -- but nobody wants to drill any more out of the aquifer. Nobody wants to suck any more out of the aquifer. So I would just like to throw it in there that we want to look at alternatives ways of capturing drinking water short of sucking it out of the aquifer. Can I leave that in?
